



A Short History of the College

VICTORIA COLLEGE was founded in memory of Queen Victoria to provide a biberal education for the sons of Egyptians and residents in Egypt. In order to build and equip the College a fund was raised to which members of the different nationalities represented in Egypt and their friends in England contributed. A site of 25,000 pies overlooking the eastern harbour having been presented to the trustees by Mr. G. B. Alderson, the foundation stone was laid by Viscount Cromer on 25th April, 1901. On 1st November 1902 the College opened with 25 boys and eight masters, with Mr. C. R. Lias, M.A., as Headmaster. Four years later the old site was sold to Mr. Alderson for £ 1,00,000 with which sum the present site of about 18 feddans was purchased and new buildings erected. The foundation stone was laid by the Countess of Cromer on 24th May, 1906 (the anniversary of Queen Victoria's birthday), and the College, opened informally on the 15th October, 1908, was inaugurated officially on 27th March, 1908, by H.R.H. The Duke of Connaught.

The school year 1908-1909 proved, as was anticipated, a hard and trying one, but a special tram-service with a new station at the school door, was organised through the courtesy of the directors of the Ramleh Railway Company. This overcame the difficulties of transport and school hours, and the young transplanted school took firm root. The number of boys in this year was 148. The school flourished and its Old Boys began to make their mark in several countries besides Egypt. The outbreak of Word War I in 1914 was soon followed by repercussions and the number of pupils dwindled. The military authorities requisitioned the buildings on the 28th April, 1915, and the school returned to the Old Buildings at Mazarita, the new buildings becoming the 17th General Hospital. The new buildings were reoccupied in July, 1919 and this marked the end of the second period of the school's bistory.

The school needed funds if it was to survive and Lord Allenby in May, 1920 launched an appeal for donations towards an endowment fund. The response, although not as great as hoped for, freed the College from immediate financial worries.

The years 1921-1838 were notable for a steady increase in numbers, and a growing reputation throughout the Middle East and the United Kingdom. Old Victorians with a pride in their school were moving about the world, and the value of the public school education provided at the College became known far and wide. Mr. Edwin Goar gave a valuable corner site in 1927 and a new dormitory was added in 1930. By 1937 the numbers had increased to 500 and in the same year Mr. and Mrs. K. P. Birley presented the invaluable Hall which bears their name. With the outbreak of war in 1939 the College was again requisitioned by the Naval and Militarday became known as the 64th General Hospital. The School was transferred from Victoria to San Stefano. With the movement of hostilities towards the Egyptian frontier and the resultant air raids on Alexandria, it was decided to seek accommodation for boarders in Cairo and an ex-Italian school in Shubra was taken over in September, 1940. This school opened on the 8th October, 1940 with 70 boarders and 90 dayboys, whilst the School at San Stefano reopened in the same month with 360 dayboys. The years 1939 to 1944 were most trying ones for boys, staff and Council ailke, and no school has probably ever undergone such trials twice and survived so successfully. The School moved back to Victoria during the summer of 1944 and opened on the 4th October. This date marks the end of the third period of its history.

The war years and the post-war years saw no lessening in the applications for admission. On the contrary, the demand increased to such an extent that the branch at Cairo grew apace and finally came into being as a separate school in 1948. The College received a substantial grant from the Victory Thanksgiving Fund and three more dormitories, seven classrooms, three science laboratories and a woodwork shop were added. Fifty additional boarders were admitted and every country in the Middle East was represented. In 1950 three Old Victorian brothers, Mesrs, Victor, Albert and Jack Bassili presented a magnificent swimming pool in memory of their late brother, Mr. Bassili Bassili, and Mr. Edwin Goar gave a badly-needed gymnasium of ample proportions. Other Old Victorians and friends have also remembered the College in its effort to keep abreast of the times.
